WINTER IS COMING! GUIDE TO GETTING PLANTS READY FOR THE WINTER PRESENTED BY ROBERT SCOTT

It's getting cold outside and that means it's time to talk about preparing for the winter! That's exactly what Robert Scott has planned for our next meeting. Robert will be giving a presentation on how to get our plants ready for the wet cold weather that is coming our way. He will talk about the difference between Summer and Winter growers, when to water, how to protect from frost and much more. If you're new to growing cactus and succulents or just need new ideas this is the presentation for you!



Robert also happens to be our Club's Treasurer for the last couple years. It's why he's always taking money at the back of the room. His passion for plants started as a little kid when his Grandma taught him how to grow vegetables, which eventually expanded to ornamentals, orchids, and water plants. His knowledge grew and he earned a degree in Plant Science from Fresno State. From there his love of cactus and succulents took root.

With the help of his best friend Nick Deinhart he learned that he could create new hybrids of aloes and a new obsession started. He grows all types of cactus and succulents but aloes are his favorite with over 120 pure species in his collection. When the local nursery he was working at went out of business he got the ball rolling on his idea of starting his own cactus and succulent nursery. He started Desert Roots Nursery in the Spring of 2015. It's been a long process to get the business up but he enjoys every minute of it. The last 6 months the nursery has been on the back burner as he started a job with Fresno County in their Agricultural Department but will have the nursery online and ready for sale by this coming Spring. He offers a large selection cactus, succulents, and air plants, priding himself in providing top quality plants. The nursery has taken him a while, but when it's done it will be amazing!

He hopes everyone comes to the meeting with lots of questions and learns something new!

Getting to Know You

Don Winton

Not many people have experienced what it feels like to be in a lookout tower when an earthquake hits.

Don Winton has. "Boy, how that thing rocked!" he remembers of the event.

The earthquake happened years ago, during the time Don worked for the Forest Service at the Goat Mountain Fire Lookout (elevation 4,634 feet) in Sierra National Forest. Built in 1915, the cabin building blew down during the winter of 1916, then was reconstructed twice, the last time after winds shifted the tower on the base. The base was replaced with a 20 feet Pacific Coast Steel tower. Metal chairs in the tower were equipped with insulators to prevent electric shock of the occupant, should lightning hit the tower.



"Storms were exciting," says Don. "Sometimes it was hard to sleep, hearing the wind. You could feel the lightning and thunder in your chest. We were never hit by lightning, at least not while I was there. Should lightning hit something below, it was important to mark the location on the window, because something could catch fire later... Every ten minutes I made a lookout for fires and reported in three times a day.

"The lookout tower had everything you needed. Most of the time it was very peaceful and I had my little dachshund for company."

The Forest Service loss has been the club's gain. A newer member, Don helped out during both the June Show and Sale and the September Members Sale by transporting plants, helping arrange them and other activities.

"Years ago, when I was a kid, I took a four year vocational horticultural class and my mom was big into plants," says Don. "When I was looking up online where to buy succulents, up popped FC&SS."

Aloes, sedums and sansevierias are currently among Don's favorites.

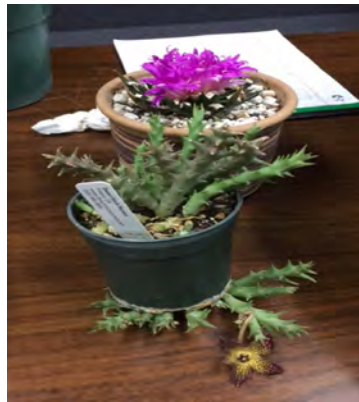
"I like simple," he says. "I just want to learn how to take care of what I like. Some of the more unusual stuff catches my eye....It bothers me to kill a two dollar plant - I don't want to kill a two hundred dollar plant!"

Originally from Tranquility, Don likes to write and has always enjoyed the outdoors and nature. He's an avid birdwatcher and is an experienced Spotted Owl observer.

"I like to walk around in the hills," he says. "You never know what you'll see next."

CLUB WORKSHOP: At the October workshop we discussed winter growers and some of these were brought for show and comments. We looked at plants in genera starting with Q-R-S—Rebutia, Sulcorebutia, Raphionacme, Stenocereus, Sarcocaulon, Sansevieria, Seyregia, Ritterocereus. Karl Church brought a flat of Hippeastrum seedlings to give away. Other plants shown included Ariocarpus species in bloom, Adenium arabicum, Cyphostemma, Operculicaria, Tylecodon paniculatum. Jack Fleming brought a large Pachypodium succulentum that had lost its roots, showing that he rooted it in pure pumice over water—that is, the water was poured in the saucer under the plant and the plant, sensing the water, produced roots to reach down to the moisture. Others bringing plants included Ed Etheridge, Mary Drumheller, Ann Beirbower, Sue Haffner, Tom Meyer and Dennis Anderson. Dan Gale brought a flat of succulent starts to give away. Thanks to all of them.

The November workshop will be Wednesday, November 16th, 6 p.m., at 3733 N. Sierra Vista, Fresno. Genera for show and tell are those starting with T-U-V. Discussion topic will be “Putting to bed for winter.” All members are welcome.

WINTER GROWERS

Usually referred to as the “winter growers”, these genera are dormant during the warmer months of May through August. Their primary growth actually occurs during autumn and spring while slowing considerably during true winter. Many will exhibit marginal growth during the summer months as well especially in the Lily and Crassulaceae families. (Thanks to Vickie Veen for the article below, though Mary Drumheller showed me that I had used this exact same list in the January 2004 newsletter!)

Adromischus, Aeonium, Aloe, Anacampseros, Astroloba, Avonia, Bowiea, Bulbine, Ceraria, Conophytum, Cotyledon, Crassula, Dioscorea, Dudleya, Fouqueria, Casteria, Gibbaeum, Graptopetalum, Graptoveria, Haemanthus, Haworthia, Kalanchoe, Neohenricia, Othonna, Pachycormus, Pachyphytum, Pachyveria, Pelargonium, Peperomia, Portulacaria, Sansevieria, Sarcocaulon, Sedeveria, Sedum, Senecio, Stomatium, Talinum, Tylecodon.

FRESNO FAIR REPORT

Another Fresno Fair has come and gone. Many thanks to those of you who put in some time monitoring the cactus and succulent display—you are listed below in Rudy Rulloda’s statement. I wasn’t able to put in as much time as usual, as I’ve been on a jury in Fresno County Superior Court since September 8th. Lucky me.

Club members who exhibited plants were Bill Gale, Rudy Rulloda, Sue Haffner, Chuck Thew, Val McCullough and Alyssa Ortega. I’m happy to say that almost all of them won at least one blue ribbon. Best Cactus was Bill’s *Mammillaria plumosa* and Best Succulent was Robert Hanford’s *Adenia spinosa*. Bill won sweepstakes in succulents and Sue won sweepstakes in cactus. In addition, Bill’s big plumeria was judged Best Foliage Plant. Alyssa entered some very nice dish gardens, and Val entered begonias and other foliage plants. Cactus and succulent entries were down a bit from last year, though I don’t think you could tell from the nice display. Some classes only had one entry (see, if you had entered plants you would have had a very good chance of winning a ribbon—and a premium check.)

I appreciated how Dwight Horiuchi arranged the entries, keeping the plants in the same classes together as much as it was possible to do so. That way you could see how the judges looked at the class. I know that not everyone likes this arrangement. It’s been tradition for many years to mix the plants all around to create an aesthetic display, but I like the more educational arrangement.

The Greenhouse Building was devoted entirely to Floriculture this year and it looked great. The bonsai display was spectacular and even included a cabinet of viewing stones. Superintendent Jennifer Waite and her staff deserve a lot of credit for making sure everything ran smoothly during the two weeks of the Fair. Sue

ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR 2017

The election of officers 2017 will be conducted at the November meeting. The Nomination Committee is proud to announce its' recommendations, which are shown in the sample ballot reproduced in the adjacent column. Members of the nominating committee, Rosanna Rojas and Vickie Veen made an effort to contact eligible members to determine if they had any interest in holding elective office. The committee may nominate more than one candidate for the same position if that person expresses an interest and is found to be qualified. Additional candidates may be nominated from the floor at the meeting. Proposed nominees must be qualified under the Standing Rules, demonstrate an understanding of the responsibilities of the office and express a willingness to serve.

We will try to consume as little time as possible with the election process, so as to not interfere with the evening's program. Ballots will be passed out as soon as there has been an opportunity to see if there are to be any nominations from the floor. **Please bring a pencil or a pen with which to mark your ballot.** After all of the candidates have been introduced, we will ask for a voice vote to elect those unopposed candidates. You will then mark your ballot for the remaining unfilled offices, fold it and **after your name is checked from the eligibility list**, deposit your ballot in the ballot box. **Please wear your membership badge for quick identification.** When the balloting is concluded the regular meeting will be continued and the Committee will go to a quiet location and count the votes. Any candidate or their designee will be allowed to observe the counting procedures. A Statement of Results form will be filled out and signed by the election officials. The ballots and a copy of the results statement will be sealed in a large envelope and preserved for a year. It may only be opened by an order from the Board of Directors in the event of some controversy.

The results of the election will be announced at the conclusion of the meeting's program presentation.
