On April 18th, the California Fish and Wildlife

Commission unanimously recognized the uplifting of the Mojave Desert Tortoise from "threatened" to "endangered" under the California Endangered Species Act. This culminates a multi-year effort by the Defenders of Wildlife, Desert Tortoise Council and Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee.

IS IT POSSIBLE TO LOVE A SPECIES TO DEATH?

The Joshua Tree National Park, 800,000 acres 140 miles east of Los Angeles, now attracts twice as many visitors than it did a decade ago. Lately it's become an "in" destination. From *The New York Times* on down, lyrical stories about the desert and its iconic plant have appeared in many publications. The pandemic assisted in this, as well, as people desperate to get out of the house headed to Joshua Tree (only to find a lot of other people who had the same idea.)

Despite appearances, the desert environment is fragile. It evolved over the millennia with only a light touch by humans. The attention it's receiving now is doubleedged: it's great that more people appreciate the desert and its plants, but the increased visitation can be a burden.

The western Joshua tree, *Yucca brevifolia*, is more endangered than the eastern Joshua tree, *Yucca jaegeriana*. In recent years millions of both have been lost, killed by the York Fire in 2023 and the Dome Fire in 2020. In addition, more have been lost to housing and solar farms, which are popping up across the Mohave Desert.

Joshua trees were twice considered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for listing under the Endangered Species Act, but were denied both times. In 2020 the California Fish and Game Commission accepted the western Joshua tree for listing under the state's own Endangered Species Act.

The Mohave is experiencing rapid aridification. The annual precipitation has dropped by 39% from 1895 to 2016, while the annual temperature increased by 3 degrees. Has the speed of change outpaced the ability of environmental laws to make a difference?

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JACARATIA



If you are looking for a fast-growing caudex producing plant, you might give Jacaratia a try. This is a genus of trees or shrubs native to areas of Brazil. Paraguay, and northern Argentina, growing in loose or sandy soils, in the open or as part of the understory. These woodlands have clearly defined wet and dry seasons, hence, jacaratias have developed very large underground water storage organs.

The 5-7 species of Jacaratia are in the papaya family, so produce prominent fruit, some of which is edible, even served in restaurants. The plants are dioecious—each plant is either male or female—so one of each is required if you want fruit. In habitat the seeds are distributed endozoochory (by ingestion by mice, bats and other small mammals.)

Culture: needs a well-drained mix, plenty of water and fertilizer in the active growing season. Protect from frost. *Sue* (Photo: www.davesgarden.com)

KALANCHOE LUCIAE



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Kalanchoe Luciae is a deservedly popular succulent that makes a prominent statement in a pot or in the ground. The fleshy, paddle-like leaves, usually 4-6 inches long to 2-5 inches wide, are covered with gray bloom and the leaf margins take on a reddish hue when exposed to bright light and/or in response to winter temperatures.

It is native to tropical South Africa, Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Swaziland.

Sold under the moniker "Flapjacks." It has also been widely distributed under the name *Kalanchoe thyrsiflora*, a different but similarly-appearing species. They differ in flower structure, color and fragrance, *K. thyrsiflora* being much more fragrant. Spectacular variegated hybrids have been developed.

In late winter to early spring mature *K. luciae* plants put up a stalk of pale yellow tubular flowers. The stem will elongate when blooming is immanent. The rosette is monocarpic—will die after blooming—but the plant will branch at the base.


Culture is similar to other leaf succulents: well-drained potting mix, adequate water in the active growing season, bright light. It is apparently hardy to near-freezing temperatures. Snails find the plants delicious, so keep the area around the base of the plant clear of other foliage. Propagation is by cuttings, leaves or seeds. *Sue*


