# California Cholla Changes

# Recent research and name changes in the Cylindropuntia of the Californias

# Speaker: Michelle Cloud-Hughes

**Summary**: The chollas (*Cylindropuntia*) are a vital component of many southwestern ecosystems, providing habitat and food for a diverse array of wildlife and plants. Recent research into the genetics and morphology of the chollas has led to an improved understanding of the evolutionary relationships within the genus.



In the first part of my talk, I'll relate the highlights of our prickly cholla research expeditions, the ongoing trials and tribulations of making valid scientific name changes, the current names for our California and Baja California chollas, and the many questions still to be addressed. The second part of my talk will cover the exciting story of our recently published ×*Cylindronia robertsii*, the first documented intergeneric hybrid between *Cylindropuntia* and *Grusonia*. Although originally suspected of being an intergeneric hybrid, this extremely rare cactus was named *Grusonia robertsii* until our recent genetic and morphometric work was able to verify its *Cylindropuntia* × *Grusonia* parentage.



**Speaker Bio:** Michelle Cloud-Hughes is a botanist and restoration ecologist specializing in the desert flora and ecosystems of North America. She began her career working for the Soil Ecology and Restoration Group at San Diego State University, working mainly in the California deserts. In 2010 she started her company, Desert Solitaire Botany and Ecological Restoration, and since then has worked on rare plant surveys and other botanical research and restoration projects throughout the southwestern U.S. and Mexico. She is an authority on the

genus *Cylindropuntia* and an author of *Cylindropuntia chuckwallensis*, a rare California endemic and the most recent addition to California's cactus flora. Most recently, she and her fellow chollistas published ×*Cylindronia robertsii*, the first documented intergeneric hybrid between *Cylindropuntia* and *Grusonia*.


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# **Membership Renewal**

**Fresno Fair Report:** Congratulations to Roz Tampone, who won Best Succulent with a nice *Euphorbia decaryi*. Other club members who showed plants were Rosanna Rojas, Rudy Rulloda, Sue Haffner, Lynne Rayner and former member Val McCullough. All won blue ribbons. Best Cactus was a large, well-grown Peanut Cactus (*Lobivia silvestrii*) shown by non-member Brenda Fennell. (This person has been showing plants at the Fair for years. She really should join our club!)

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**CLEANING CLAY POTS:** In our hard-water area it's inevitable that our clay flower pots will become encrusted with mineral salts residue. While some growers like the looks of such pots many want to know how to clean them.

First, clean as much dirt from the pot as you can, using a brush or a hose.

Then soak the pot in a solution of vinegar and water for as long as you think necessary.

Lastly, scrub any residue from the pot and rinse.

**EPONYM** = a person after whom a discovery, invention, place, etc. is named. We encounter a lot of eponyms in botany: for instance, *Echinocereus engelmannii*, named in honor of George Engelmann, a German-American botanist who explored the flora of the Western deserts (he has other plants named for him, as well); or *Yucca whipplei*, named for A.W. Whipple, a leader of the U.S. Mexico Boundary Survey after the Mexican War. This was an immensely important project, which produced maps and surveys of the flora and fauna of the West. Well, you get the picture: eponyms in botany are not bestowed in a frivolous manner, but recognize an individual related to the discovery of the plant.

Now there is a movement afoot to stop naming plants and animals after persons. This seems to have its origin in recent years as the naming of places for Confederate officers or slaveholders has come under scrutiny. Some ornithologists began questioning whether birds named in the 19<sup>th</sup> century should be renamed. This movement has now gone international, with this statement: "We believe that naming species in honor of real people is unnecessary and objectively difficult to justify ... The earth's biodiversity is part of a global heritage that should not be trivialized by association with any single human individual, whatever their perceived worth." (from a sub-group of the International Commission on Zoological Nomenclature.)

There has been some push-back about this from the ICZN and the International Association of Plant Taxonomy, but I expect we'll hear more about this contentious issue.

## SELDOM SEEN SUCCULENTS: TAVARESIA



*Tavaresia* is a small genus of stapeliads comprised of only two species, angolensis and barklyi (pictured.) It is a stem succulent with angled stems armed with bristle-like spines which are needle-sharp but soft when wet. It forms clumps of stems which can be either tightly packed or open, depending on how much sun it gets.

The flowers are spectacular, large tubular blooms which arise from the base of the stems which widen to the mouth where the lobes flare. They are cream in color with maroon stripes on the outside, mostly cream with maroon spots inside.

*Taveresia* has a wide distribution in the arid and semiarid regions of tropical and subtropical Africa south of the equator. The two species have never been found growing together. *T. angolensis* is recorded from the coastal region of Angola, found in sandy areas on low outcrops of rocks among dunes, usually within 60 km of the coast. *T. barklyi* is found from Angola and Namibia, along river valleys across northern South Africa, to Botswana and Zimbabwe, usually in stony locations in crevices or around the bases of spiny shrubs or trees.

The genus was established by Welwitsch in 1854. He dedicated it to Jose Tavares de Macedo, the Portuguese official whose ministry assisted his travel. (Angola had been a Portuguese colony from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century until independence

in 1975.) Twenty years later another explorer described the same genus as *Decabelone*, and you may find this name in some plant books, but it is invalid.

These plants are not too difficult to grow. Indirect light is best, a gritty soil mix, sparingly watered, hardy to about 40 degrees. Propagation is by seeds or cuttings. The flowers are not as stinky as other stapeliads. (Illus. from <u>www.worldofsucculents.com</u>)

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### ASTROPHYTUM ORNATUM

Astrophytum ornatum is the largest species in the genus, globular when young, but becoming columnar with age, reaching as much as 6 feet in height. It is also the fastest growing of the genus.

It is characterized by cross-bands of wooly white scales, and is probably the most fiercely-spined of the astrophytums. The flowers are yellow.

It is the southernmost of the genus, native to the highlands of the Mexican states of Hidalgo, Queretaro and San Luis Potosi, where it is locally abundant in wild canyons and limestone cliffs. Its habitat is threatened by mining activities and by goat grazing.

This species is probably the easiest astrophytum to grow. I planted one in an outdoor bed where it gets full sun, rain, frost—whatever—and it has survived for years.
