Annual Show & Sale Information

In less than 2 weeks, our Annual Show & Sale will be taking place! You better have this event marked on your calendar and you better be there!

Volunteers

During setup on Friday, anyone who is volunteering can drive into the Fairgrounds to drive right up to the building. You will enter from the gate on Chance Avenue and drive through the Fairgrounds. A map will be attached to the newsletter. For the volunteers who are helping on Saturday and Sunday, you will need to park in the parking lot at Butler and Chance Avenue or park on Butler. Boxes

Boxes can be dropped off at the Fairgrounds on June 7th during setup. You will be able to drive right in to the Fairgrounds to drop off the boxes. This can be done from 10 am to 7 pm.

Members Early Sale

The Early Members Sale will take place on June 7th after setup. **Members who signed up to volunteer during the weekend can start shopping at 5:30 pm.** All other members can start shopping at 6 pm. The early sale ends at 7 pm. Look for a map at the end of the newsletter for driving instructions for early sale and box drop-off.

Annual Plant Show

It's not too late to get your plants ready to show. I emailed a guide on getting your plants ready to show but let's do a quick overview. First, clean up the plant by removing cobwebs, old and yellow leaves, and any weeds. Then clean the pot the best you can, some scrubbing might be needed. That's really all you need. If you want to have a complete look, you can add a top dressing of small pebbles. This covers the soil and makes a clean complete look. You can also stage your plant by adding larger rocks to make it look like it's growing in habitat. The main thing we are looking for when judging is a clean well-grown plant. Remember this is for you to show off your hard work and its fun! Show plant drop-off is on June 7th from 11 am to 6 pm. Pickup is on Sunday, June 9th, starting no earlier than 4 pm when the event closes. People showing will be able to drive into the Fairgrounds for drop-off and pick up. If you have any questions about showing your plant, please contact me.

CORYPHANTHA TO ESCOBARIA

The following coryphanthas have been transferred to *Escobaria: Coryphantha alversonii, C. chlorantha, C. vivipara ssp rosea*. Plants of these two genera are very similar in appearance.

TREE ALOES



On May 10th, Colin Walker presented the CSSA webinar on the genus *Aloidendron* to which all the so called tree aloes have been transferred.

The characteristics of these plants is that they have woody stems, fissured bark,

usually single trunk, dichotomous branching, leaves narrowly lanceolate, dried leaves not persistent, inflorescence a branched panicle.

Recognized species are: *Aloidendron dichotomum*, *A. dichotomum ssp ramosissimum*, *A. eminens*, *A. pillansii*, *A. barberae*, *A. tongaense*. Some authorities consider ramosisimum to be a species in its own right.

The photo (from Wikipedia) shows an ancient plant of *A. dichotomum.*



Hercules' is a tree aloe cultivar that is very popular with California growers. It is cross between *A. barberae* (seed parent) and *A. dichotomum*, (pollen parent).

Its origins are not known for

sure, but Gerhard Bock, on his blog Succulents and more, did some sleuthing and proposes that 'Hercules' was possibly created in the 1980s by Jim Gardner, a southern California doctor and succulent grower. It is especially known for its fast growth. Plants have been known to grow so fast that they become top heavy and topple over.

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GEOHINTONIA MEXICANA

Geohintonia is a monospecific genus (only one species) growing in a very small, specialized area in the state of Nuevo León, Mexico. It is named for its formal discoverer, Mexican botanist George S. Hinton, though collected plants had been found in collections before then, especially in Europe.

Geohintonia mexicana has a very distinctive appearance: bluish-green globose,

solitary plants, with well-defined ribs, areoles woolly at the apex, becoming smooth with age; few or no papery spines, becoming deciduous. The flowers open in the daytime, self-sterile, intense pink to magenta.

The plants grow om steep hills or cliffs of pure gypsum at an altitude of around 1200 meters with *Aztekium hintonii* and other cacti and succulents. Comprehensive DNA studies have not yet been carried out on this genus, but some experts think it may be an intergeneric hybrid between *Echinocactus horizonthalonius* and *Aztekium ritteri*.

Plants and seeds seem readily available online, but care should be taken to be sure you do not buy an illegally collected plant. *Sue*

AFRICAN MILK BUSH



The so-called African Milk Bush has been cultivated as an ornamental plant for many years. It was formerly known as *Synadenium grantii rubra* (pictured, from <u>www.llifle.com</u>) but has now been renamed *Euphorbia umbellata*. The red-leaved form ("rubra") is the most common, though there is a plain green-leaved form.

The species is native to a wide area of central east Africa (Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, Rwanda) on rocky hills and open woodlands. It's a thornless, semi-succulent shrub or small tree, branched, moderately slow growing. The fleshy leaves are green with varying amounts of red spots or dashes, some plants with deeply red foliage.

The plant has escaped cultivation in favorable climates and become invasive in India, Cuba, tropical Australia and other areas.

"Milk bush" refers, of course, to the milky latex that is produced when the plant is cut or otherwise injured. This is toxic and care should be taken when handling the plant. Culture: keep watered in summer; leaves will curl when the plant is too dry. It can rest in the winter. **Sue**


TWENTY YEARS AGO IN THE CLUB:


